
Previous Guidelines

Levels of Review

1

 Read titles and abstracts to determine if the article appeared to address inclusion criteria

2

 Read full manuscript to confirm that the article addressed inclusion criteria

Lit Review

Participants

- Level 1: 2449 Abstracts
- - Level 2: 874 full manuscripts

- Over 100 volunteers
- 6 adults with SB
- 4 parents of children with SB


